
"Oh, I am going to sing bass myself."







Studio Notes

"A Slave of Vanity," which will be the first Robertson-Cole super-special in which Pauline Frederick will appear. is laid partly in London, and the producers left nothing undone to produce every effect found in the Sir Arthur Wing Pinero play, "Iris," which was the basis of this picture. Although "Iris" is a play dealing with a most cultured and sophisticated class of people, many of its scenes are laid in the open.

One of them shows the heroine in the streets of London, and, in order that the exhibitors who obtain "A Slave of Vanity" as an attraction might show their patrons a real London fog, Henry Otto, who directs the first Pauline Frederick picture under her new contract, used special effects.

A portion of a London street was erected on the new Roberston-Cole lot, and on the night the scene was shot practically the entire lighting equipment of the studio was ranged along the sidewalk. Five men were stationed on the roofs of the buildings armed with big fire hose, turned down to the finest spray, and at the command of the director these were directed toward the centre of the set, which created the effect of a dense fog drifting in from

Through this mist could be seen the dim lights of the street lamps and an occasional light from a nearby house. The effect on the screen will be that of a Rembrandt painting, with its various values of lights and shadows.

Although the scene was taken over and over again to insure its correctness, and Miss Frederick emerged from it dripping wet each time, working up until one o'clock in the morning, she did not seem to mind it. Her entire concern was for the many "extras" who served as atmosphere, and for the tiny little pet bird she carried with her through the fog.

The idea of right thinking furnishes the basic idea for the story of the Cecil B. De Mille production, "Something to Think About," which was written by Jeanie Macpherson. Its theme is of the loftiest and its treatment is of that same high artistic standard which has made Mr. DeMille's previous productions decidedly distinctive. In the early scenes the quaint rural characteristics of Luke Anderson, a blacksmith, and his daughter Ruth, are said to have a rollicking humor that is captivatingly presented. When the daughter, already engaged to a rich young man of the neighborhood, elopes with Jim Dirk, a young man of her own station in life, the clouds of tragedy gather quickly. 0.10


